In-eligible uses of ARPA Funds

- A) Statutory Restrictions Under the ARPA
 - 1) Tax cuts, tax rebates, direct tax refunds or reduction in net tax revenue.
 - 2) Deposits into pension funds.
- B) Other Restrictions on Use
 - 1) Debt Service and replenishing reserves.
 - 2) Settlements and Judgements.
 - 3) General Restrictions
 - a) Uses that conflict or contravene the statutory purpose of ARPA, including expenditures that undermine the efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19.
 - b) Violations of the conflict-of-interest requirements.
 - c) Conflicts of Federal, State, and Local laws and regulations.





BENEFICIARY V. SUBRECIPIENT CHECKLIST

RECIPIENT



Subrecipient

- Determines who is eligible to receive Federal assistance.
- Measures performance based on meeting objectives of the Federal program.
- Is responsible for programmatic decision making.
- Is responsible for ensuring Federal requirements outlined in the award are followed.
- Uses the Federal funds to carry out a program as opposed to providing goods/services.

Beneficiary

- Is an individual or organization receiving the funds as the end user or entity directly benefitting from the financial assistance.
- Does not determine eligibility or compliance.

Recovery

Direct Beneficiary Grants


- Available to non-profits 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(19), small businesses, hotels, 3rd party and government organizations.
- Must demonstrate negative economic impact due to COVID-19.
- May apply for grant for a response proportional to demonstrated impact.
- Demonstrated impacts include:
 - Decreased revenue (e.g., from donations and fees, shutdowns, etc.)
 - Financial insecurity
 - Increased costs (e.g., uncompensated increases in service need)
 - Capacity to weather financial hardship.
 - Challenges covering payroll, rent/mortgage, or other operating costs.

Examples of Eligible Uses

Direct Beneficiary Grants

- Grants to mitigate financial hardship such as:
 - Supporting payroll and benefits, and costs to retain employees.
 - Mortgage, rent, utility and other operating costs.
 - Technical Assistance
 - Counseling
 - Other services to support business planning.
- Grants to cover costs associated with COVID-19 mitigation and prevention strategies such as
 - Personal protective equipment (gloves, masks, hand washing stations, etc.)
 - Ventilation system installation or improvements.
 - Communication efforts.
 - Support for isolation/quarantine.
 - Monitoring/contact tracing surveillance.

REINVESTMENTS



Reinvestment *Subrecipient Awards*

- Available to non-profits, 3rd party and government organizations that provide community services to the Township.
- Awarded to an organization to carry out eligible uses of funds *on behalf* of the Township (must adhere to CFR 200 requirements for Administering Federal Funding).
- Must identify a COVID-19 public health or economic impact on an individual or community group.
- Must design or fund a program/project that responds to that impact.
- *Greater consideration will be given to programs/projects that serve disproportionately impacted or economically disadvantaged individuals or communities within the Township, including the impacted senior citizen and special needs populations.

Examples of Eligible Uses *Subrecipient Awards*

- Public health programs designed to prevent or mitigate the spread of COVID-19 for an impacted population.
- Food Insecurity Programs
- Behavioral Healthcare Programs
- Violence Prevention Programs
- Affordable Housing Assistance Programs
- Childcare and Early Learning Services
- Programs that support vulnerable or other impacted populations within the Township.

October 31, 2022	Release of application
November – December 2022	Information sessions and assistance
January 31, 2023	Deadline for application submissions
November – February 2023	Application review period
March 2023	Township staff begin drafting grant agreements
